



Who Allowed *You* to Live in My Memories? by Rev. David R. Hatch

Back in Iowa, about ten years after my mom had passed, Dad had fallen ill with terminal cancer. It was a rough comeback for Dad during those lonesome years, but about a year after Mom was gone God provided him with a wonderful new walking partner in his new wife. Dad sold our childhood home, affectionately known as "840" for its address, and the newlyweds moved to a newer home. We were happy for them.

But now it was Dad's turn to get ready for departure. All of us remaining siblings surrounded Dad during those final days. Funny thing, he seemed very ready, it was us grown kids who were struggling with this upcoming passing. As we were soon to learn, we would be putting our family of origin to rest, almost like we were burying Mom all over again. Our childhoods were about to officially end, except in our memories.

Dad was doing relatively fine under care at a hospice residence facility. We were told it would only be a week or so until The Glory Train came to take him to his Heavenly Home. He even asked for a vest and name tag from Wal-Mart, saying "I would like to be the Wal-Mart greeter when I get to Heaven, welcoming all the newcomers." We got him the vest and the name tag. He smiled; confident he would get the position he was applying for.

My sister, always ten years older than me and one hundred times more sentimental, thought it would be a fun thing to go over to our childhood home since we were all in town and take a tour of the house we grew up in. Bonnie Jean knew the new owners and she was certain they would not mind if asked. My brother and I agreed. She made the arrangements and off we went across our little town to what will always be the finest neighborhood on the God's green earth. Oh the memories I have of that house!

In my mind, I can still walk through it, every inch of it! Over there is where the flocked Christmas tree always was. Here is where we hung our stockings. Right over there is where my brother Larry and I would lap up ice cream with Hershey's syrup as we watched Bonanza. Oh, and here is my room with that door to the attic that always scared me so much at night. See Dad's rose bushes? Down here is Dad's woodshop where he would reappear after several hours and present another family heirloom. We used to hang a hammock between those two trees and sleep out in the yard on summer nights! See this spot, this is where we'd wash our cars on the lawn. Do you want to go up in the attic where Mom stored the Christmas presents? Come on, let's go! Or how about going over to the park across the

street? Hey, let's go around the block on our bikes! Or maybe knock on the neighbor's door and see if they want to play toy trucks! Maybe tonight we will get all the neighbor kids together and play "Hide and Go Seek." Are you in? I imagine that you do memory-tours of your childhood home too, am I right? Some folks avoid driving by their old homes because it will spoil their memories. But the good memories are archived and untouchable. I was soon to have that tested.

When we pulled up to the "840", it was not the same... many things had changed. The bushes were bigger, the pines were taller, and the color of the house had taken on a new shade. But I understood that. We went to the back door, the common entrance for us when we lived there, and it seemed to still be the familiar passage for the new owners. Bonnie Jean rang the bell and we waited. Little did I know until I have thought about it even years later, my emotions were engaged in a time travel experience I can only explain this way...

When that very unfamiliar stranger opened the door to my house, in a sort of stunned way my mind silently asked, "Who are you and who gave you permission to live in my memories?" I shall never forget that.

The tour of the house was disappointing, yet it taught me a treasured thing, to value and hold secure the untouchable archives of my good memories and that the blessing stored there no one can rob me of and nothing can change them.

If you saw the movie, "Trip to Bountiful", a similar scene appears in that film. An elderly

Estate Planning: Part 1

Where There's a Will, There's a Way

The pages of TOMORROW™ are designed to help our readers travel their grief journey, secure in the knowledge that they are not alone. To that end, we hope the following article--Part 1 of a 4 part series--sheds valuable light on this sometime misunderstood aspect of estate planning. This is only intended as general information and you should contact your legal and tax representative for advice based on your specific fact situation.

The Importance of a Will

A Will is important because it allows you to:

- a) Decide who gets your estate after you die.
- b) Decide who should act as guardian if you die with minor children.
- c) Decide whether your beneficiaries receive their gifts from you outright or in a trust.
- d) Select a personal representative who will have control over your assets and have the responsibility to pay bills and to distribute your estate.

Dying Without a Will

If you die in Wisconsin without a Will, state law requires that the court appoint a personal representative who distributes your entire estate to your surviving spouse – unless you have children from outside your current marriage. In that case, your spouse retains half the marital property and receives half your individual property, with the rest of your estate split equally among



all your children from this marriage and outside it.

If you do not have a spouse or surviving children when you die, the law lists the order in which parents, brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews, grandparents, grandchildren and other kin will inherit property.

A Will Saves Money

Well-drawn Will provisions can reduce estate and inheritance taxes. You also may eliminate the cost of a bond for your personal representative by including a simple clause stating that no bond is required. Clear provisions for minor children help avoid often costly, court-supervised guardianship.

Challenging A Will

A properly executed will can be challenged in court for any of three reasons:

- 1) The individual executing the Will was under duress or undue influence when the Will was made.
- 2) The person was incompetent or unable to understand the results of the will when it was made.
- 3) The Will was not executed with the proper formalities. ❖

"Does Anyone Else Hurt This Bad...and Live?"

From the depths of a pain she's experienced, Carlene Eneroth shares the struggles and survival skills she knows well.

At a mere thirty-one years of age, her husband Greg suffered a fatal heart attack in a water ski boat. She's risen from the agony of hearing the finality of those words, "he's gone," to becoming Features Editor of Bereavement Magazine. It's an inspiring success story for all to read.

Initially, she simply craved a "How To" book from which she could glean ideas from others who had traveled the grief journey. She sought to avoid the journey's potholes, and to discover practical tips to pave the bumpy road. Her search to recover from this agonizing loss allowed her to move from feeling "when all else fails, muddle through" to "I did hurt this bad... and I lived."

Carlene is the walking reality of a Hospice Director's words; "Grief is the hardest work a person will ever do—harder



than digging ditches for twelve hours a day." Carlene did manage to "muddle through" as a new mother coping with the sudden death of a spouse. But it wasn't always easy. Although she may have looked calm on the outside, inside she often wanted to scream in pain.

Within these pages, Carlene tucks practical ways to deal with life and death. Her reflections on the stages she worked through are heartwarming. She consoles us by revealing that feelings of total exhaustion; the practice of one step forward-one step back; surprise situations that trigger sorrow; sleeplessness; anger...are all very normal.

Truly, this is one of those "must read" books. Carlene's experiences and those of others, who have shared with her, will support travelers along the journey of grief during their toughest times. Indeed, others have hurt this bad...and lived! ❖

Hash Brown & Pork Bake

- 2 center cut pork chops
- 1/2 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1/4 c. milk
- 1-1/2 oz. cream cheese
- 1/2 Tbsp. mustard
- 1/8 tsp. garlic salt
- Dash of white pepper
- 1-1/2 c. frozen hash brown potatoes with onions & peppers
- 1-1/2 Tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In skillet, heat oil and brown pork chops on both

sides, about 5 minutes. Remove pork from skillet and set aside.

Add milk, cream cheese, mustard, garlic salt and pepper to skillet and cook over medium heat until cream cheese melts and mixture is smooth, stirring with a wire whisk. Add hash brown potatoes and mix. Pour mixture into 1 quart casserole and top with the pork chops.

Bake covered for 30 minutes, then uncover and bake for 15-20 minutes longer or until mixture is bubbly and pork chops are cooked. 2 Servings. ❖
