



## God is Watching Us – Right Up Close by Rev. David H. Hatch

Back in Ames, Iowa where I grew up, my brother Larry had a weekly newspaper route (that I later inherited from him). This paper, “The Ames Advertiser”, was pretty much just what the title said. It was free, full of want-ads, and Larry was in charge of delivering 100 copies of it, door to door. That “door to door” thing is important; remember it for later in the story! The year was about 1968 or so.

Well, one day when I was maybe 12, Larry hired his little brother to do the route as his “substitute” (Every newspaper boy from that era knows this term! It’s loaded with responsibility, confusion, fear, and adventure and most important, pay). Larry paid me to do the route at the lucrative wage of one cent per paper, the standard rate from the company.

I would be using his Monkey Ward [Montgomery Ward] bicycle. It was black with twin steel cargo baskets, each large enough to carry four week’s worth of groceries for a family of thirty-eight.

Oh, did I mention that the day that I happen to be his substitute there was an instant blizzard? Ah huh, yup. Well, the traumatic recollection goes like this, you see: I had the rear baskets on the bike loaded, with 100 copies of the highly coveted Ames Advertiser. Now add the sound of wind, big wind. Now, in your imagination, the temperature is cold, real cold! One minute I was on the sidewalk, and then... What sidewalk? It was disappearing! There was a surprising and swift snow squall fed by a Mach 2 wind from my right flank. The sidewalk was gone. It felt like I was pushing the bike through mounting drifts like a pioneer pushing his covered wagon over the Rockies toward California, except every 75 feet or so I had to stop, leave the bike and trudge against the elements, into the wind, to the door of every house and leave a paper there, hoping the storm doors were open. But then the unthinkable happened! The big event! The traumatic sight that I would be



the only witness of! The bike tipped over in the wind and every one of those Ames Advertisers left the bike

baskets like frightened butterflies in a tornado – They opened up, spread their want-ad wings and blew east into the frigid Iowa blizzard oblivion! Now what?

But I wasn’t the only witness! This Great Blizzard Bicycle Wreck had also been seen by a lady at a house right in front of where the newspapers left the scene of this national disaster! She had been watching my snow struggle through her front window!

And who was this lady and why was she so important? She just happened to be married to that little newspaper’s Circulation Manager! I have a brain freeze about what happened in between time, but I do know she called her husband and had replacement papers brought to me and the route somehow got done! Her watchful eye was not a coincidence, it was “Providence”.

Someone has been watching out for me all along! And you too! Psalm 139: 1-2 says, “You know when I sit and when I rise; You perceive my thoughts from afar. You discern my going out and my lying down; You are familiar with all my ways.” This is our God’s all-knowing side. This does not mean that we are going to be protected from every trouble.

It does not mean that we are always going to have miraculous rescues in the time of hardship, at least not the way we expect them. John 16:33 says, “I have told you this so that through me you may have peace. In the world you will have trouble, but be courageous-I have overcome the world!” We will overcome through Him!

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## Estate Planning: Part 4

# Powers of Attorney and Living Wills

To that end, we hope the following article--Part 2 of a 4 part series--sheds valuable light on this sometime misunderstood aspect of estate planning. This is only intended as general information and you should contact your legal and tax representative for advice based on your specific fact situation.*

### Powers of Attorney

A power of attorney authorizes another person to act for you. That person is called your agent. A durable power of attorney allows that person to act even if you become incompetent. There are basically two types of durable powers of attorney in Wisconsin; financial and health care.

To create a durable power of attorney for health care or for financial purposes you can use forms conforming to Wisconsin law, or you can have an attorney prepare individualized documents for you. Either way, there are specific requirements about how the powers of attorney should be executed and who may serve as witnesses. Completing the document incorrectly may invalidate it when it is most needed.

### Financial Power of Attorney

Depending on what you say in the durable financial power of attorney document, your agent may be able to sign legal documents in your place, buy and sell real estate for you, pay your bills and take other financial and related actions on your behalf.



### Health Care Power of Attorney

With a health care power of attorney, you appoint someone to be your "agent" to make all health care decisions – not just those involving life support – for you if you lose the ability to make decisions for yourself. You also may include a description of your treatment preferences and special desires in this document, to help guide the person making decisions for you. In this document you also may authorize your agent to admit you to a nursing home or community-based residential facility, and you may indicate your wish to donate body parts after death.

### Declaration to Physicians (Wisconsin Living Will)

A living will (Declaration to Physicians) describes the kind of life-sustaining care you would want if injury or illness leaves you in a terminal condition (dying) or a persistent vegetative state (permanent unconsciousness) with no hope of recovery.

If you have both a living will and a power of attorney for health care, the health care power of attorney controls if there is any conflict between the two.

The law regarding living wills was effective November 25, 1991. If you had a living will prepared before that date, you should review it with your attorney to be sure it still expresses your wishes. ❖
